He was a student at Montgomery College from August of 2022 to December of 2022 0:01:01.219,0:01:04.876 and you were my student, I was very glad to have you in my class. 0:01:04.876,0:01:08.307 Today, he lives with four brothers, one sister, and his parents, 0:01:08.307,0:01:12.937 and works as an Application Development Associate at Accenture. 0:01:12.937,0:01:20.043 He plans to study Computer Science at George Mason University beginning in the fall of 2023. 0:01:20.043,0:01:26.598 In his spare time, he enjoys playing soccer, as it was his dream to be a professional soccer player. 0:01:26.598,0:01:29.760 So, a little bit more background.

The story of your name and why Americans 0:03:16.620,0:03:20.199 have difficulty with it, and some of the problems you've had? 0:03:20.199,0:03:25.742 Actually, Ahmad and Muhammad, I think you know this, but it's 0:03:25.742,0:03:27.338 the names of our 0:03:27.338,0:03:29.606 Prophet Muhammad, peace be upon him, 0:03:29.606,0:03:33.139 and in Afghanistan, it's a specific rule that everyone, 0:03:33.139,0:03:34.590 every 0:03:34.590,0:03:35.901 male.. 0:03:35.901,0:03:38.949 guys should have 0:03:38.949,0:03:42.517 Ahmad and Muhammad at the beginning of their names. 0:03:42.517,0:03:47.496 So I had that name. It's like, Ahmad Elyas Sarwary, 0:03:47.496,0:03:48.962 and it's written in my 0:03:48.962,0:03:50.855 documents and everything. 0:03:50.855,0:03:52.440 So the first day that I 0:03:52.440,0:03:54.685 was in the class, 0:03:54.685,0:03:57.575 you called me Ahmad, and then I tried to 0:03:57.575,0:03:59.898 correct it, 0:03:59.898,0:04:03.235 "it's not Ahmad it's Elyas," but 0:04:03.235,0:04:07.851 I said to myself "that's okay, if they call me Ahmad, 0:04:07.851,0:04:10.493 I don't have a problem, then let it be Ahmad."

My grandparents has 0:05:18.850,0:05:21.380 so many brothers. 0:05:21.380,0:05:24.551 Brothers, cousins, and 0:05:24.551,0:05:27.688 we all were living in a small village, 0:05:27.688,0:05:29.767 in one house, 0:05:29.767,0:05:34.087 in one yard. All five brothers with their kids, with their 0:05:34.087,0:05:37.715 grandchildren. They are all living in.. 0:05:37.715,0:05:41.160 in the same area, in the same house. Like there was 0:05:41.700,0:05:44.693 a huge house that they were living together. 0:05:44.693,0:05:50.640 I was born there in 30, March of 2001.

0:05:51.660,0:05:52.715 0:05:52.715,0:05:55.150 My grandparent.. 0:05:55.150,0:05:57.136 my grandfather 0:05:57.136,0:05:58.757 was a labor, 0:05:58.757,0:06:02.747 was working and building houses there in my village. 0:06:02.747,0:06:04.539 When I grew up, 0:06:04.539,0:06:06.782 I was asking my 0:06:06.782,0:06:09.163 grandfather that "which.. 0:06:09.163,0:06:14.205 which houses you built in this area?" 0:06:14.205,0:06:17.908 and he was pointing, "this house, this house, this house, oh that..." 0:06:17.908,0:06:22.332 I said, "there's a lot of houses in this area that you already built." 0:06:23.320,0:06:26.825 My father was working with the 0:06:26.825,0:06:30.315 U.S. Embassy in Kabul, and 0:06:30.315,0:06:36.245 my mother was only working in the house and just being a mom that.. 0:06:36.245,0:06:39.840 that is for me.. that is 0:06:39.840,0:06:42.672 the most difficult job that 0:06:42.672,0:06:45.340 a woman can do, being a mom. 0:06:47.320,0:06:49.682 And T was.. 0:06:49.682,0:06:52.562 The life, at that time, was 0:06:52.562,0:06:53.400 so much easier. 0:06:53.400,0:06:59.172 I was just a kid. The only problem that we had is 0:06:59.172,0:07:04.725 doing the homework for the school that the teachers won't hit us, 0:07:04.725,0:07:08.833 or cut our points. That was the only problem that we had. 0:07:08.833,0:07:11.019 And as much as we grew up,

There was a 0:07:35.760,0:07:41.880 a public school that there were in Kabul, Afghanistan. I finished my school there, and I just 0:07:41.880,0:07:46.458 started to study German literature 0:07:46.458,0:07:49.577 in Kabul University. Actually, there was a.. 0:07:51.560,0:07:52.910 there is an exam after 0:07:52.910,0:07:58.484 every student finished their schools. They take an exam and as much as points they score, 0:07:58.484,0:08:02.892 they will give them 0:08:02.892,0:08:08.338 the field that they require according to their scores. So I take the exam.. 0:08:08.338,0:08:09.144 I took the exam, 0:08:10.120,0:08:13.878 and I scored as much as German 0:08:13.878,0:08:17.309 literature required for that exam. So I.. 0:08:17.309,0:08:17.809 I didn't like that. 0:08:19.800,0:08:21.351 I didn't want to study that 0:08:21.351,0:08:22.844 field. 0:08:22.844,0:08:25.738 I wanted to study computers. 0:08:25.738,0:08:30.167 Therefore, I applied for a scholarship in India. 0:08:30.167,0:08:36.159 I went through all the process. I finished everything, and I..

0:08:36.159,0:08:38.715 I was just waiting for my Visa and the ticket that.. 0:08:38.715,0:08:41.789 that I needed to go to India. 0:08:41.789,0:08:46.582 Everything was finished and then after that 0:08:46.582,0:08:52.823 everything happened. The tragedy of Kabul, the tragedy of Afghanistan, and the Taliban took over the country, 0:08:52.823,0:08:55.860 and I just missed the opportunity there. 0:08:56.580,0:09:00.360 I want to go back to something very interesting that you just said. 0:09:00.480,0:09:04.183 I had no idea that you studied German literature. 0:09:04.183,0:09:04.683 0:09:04.683,0:09:06.000 - Yeah. - Can you tell me 0:09:06.000,0:09:13.260 about that interest, and how you specialized in that, and why you decided you preferred to study computer science? 0:09:14.920,0:09:20.087 As I said, the exam that I took, 0:09:20.087,0:09:23.845 they had different fields for different scores 0:09:23.845,0:09:26.211 that you score at that exam. 0:09:26.211,0:09:29.548 So I scored at the level 0:09:29.548,0:09:33.420 that I could go and study German literature only. 0:09:34.080,0:09:34.580 So.. 0:09:34.580,0:09:39.663 But you did not want to be a scholar of German literature. 0:09:39.663,0:09:41.654 I didn't want that, but I.. 0:09:42.640,0:09:49.272 I went through the process of a scholarship to finish that and go to India while finishing that.. 0:09:49.272,0:09:58.339 I just told myself that I should go and see how German literature is. So I attended the class for one semester there, 0:09:58.339,0:10:01.568 and after one semester the,

the tragedy happened and we couldn't continue that. 0:10:06.660,0:10:11.161 So you had this hope of going to 0:10:11.161,0:10:13.323 a university in India, 0:10:13.323,0:10:14.793 In India, yes. 0:10:14.793,0:10:19.518 .. and your whole life completely changed. 0:10:19.518,0:10:22.035 Yes, that's correct. 0:10:22.035,0:10:24.840 Can you tell me a little bit about .. 0:10:26.640,0:10:29.398 I mean, this is a huge question, right, but 0:10:29.398,0:10:33.120 you shared a video with me of 0:10:33.960,0:10:38.738 the flights and getting on the plane and coming to the United States. 0:10:38.738,0:10:45.220 Can you.. and I'm not even sure where exactly to begin this discussion, perhaps 0:10:45.220,0:10:51.491 begin with when you realized that you were going to leave your country and come to the United States. 0:10:51.491,0:10:53.580 When did you know that that was going to happen? 0:10:55.320,0:10:56.544 I think it was 0:10:56.544,0:10:59.882 a day that I wanted to talk 0:10:59.882,0:11:06.267 with my father about the scholarship that I wanted to take to India. 0:11:06.267,0:11:09.972 I wanted to talk to him and he just told me, 0:11:09.972,0:11:13.271 "my son it's not going to happen." I said 0:11:13.271,0:11:15.760 "why?" and 0:11:15.760,0:11:16.669 he replied, 0:11:16.669,0:11:19.500 "the Taliban is coming." 0:11:20.100,0:11:23.273 The country is going to fall. 0:11:23.273,0:11:30.084 And at that moment, I just realized that the life is going to be hard, 0:11:30.084,0:11:36.259

because I didn't want to leave my country. My father, as I said, was working with the American Embassv 0:11:36.259,0:11:40.581 from 2011 and he had the chance to leave 0:11:40.581,0:11:44.361 Afghanistan at that time, in 2011. 0:11:44.361,0:11:47.072 But every time he was 0:11:47.072,0:11:49.560 asking us 0:11:49.560,0:11:52.574 and my mom, everyone said, "no we.. 0:11:52.574,0:11:58.440 we don't want to leave our country. We don't leave.. we don't want to leave our grandparents, our family here." 0:11:59.760,0:12:02.721 And so we had a chance at that time. And 0:12:02.721,0:12:17.460 after that, I just stopped everything. I didn't want to go to university. I didn't want to continue the process of that scholarship. So, on August .. 0:12:18.360,0:12:24.001 between.. there was a conflict between the U.S and the Taliban government, that 0:12:24.001,0:12:28.098 before September, you have to evacuate everything that you have 0:12:28.098,0:12:32.046 in Afghanistan. And we were awaiting 0:12:32.046,0:12:34.790 for their call to.. 0:12:34.790,0:12:45.633 to give us an opportunity to leave. Because we couldn't, at the time that Taliban came behind the gates of the Kabul, everything was 0:12:45.633,0:12:49.760 horrible. 0:12:49.760,0:12:53.467 There were no people on the streets, no people on their 0:12:53.467,0:12:54.904 works, even.. 0:12:54.904,0:12:57.724 even the airport was empty, 0:12:57.724,0:13:05.616 empty of employee. There were no one and even the security guards, they left 0:13:05.616,0:13:09.540 and the airport was totally empty. So, 0:13:11.040,0:13:21.540 on August, I think it was August 20, 2021, that we received an email from them to come. 0:13:21.540,0:13:27.720 There's many different gates that were covered by the people. They don't have.. 0:13:27.720,0:13:30.830

They didn't have any documents, any 0:13:30.830,0:13:35.851 anything, any evidence to tell them that we are able 0:13:35.851,0:13:40.722 to move or leave Afghanistan. 0:13:40.722,0:13:47.007 Everyone was trying to leave through the airport, but they 0:13:47.007,0:13:49.398 didn't have any evidence any .. 0:13:49.398,0:13:54.720 any documents that they are available for this process. 0:13:56.520,0:13:58.874 The gates were closed and we went there. 0:13:58.874,0:14:06.575 There were like thousands of people that covered the gate, and we were trying to go and 0:14:06.575,0:14:18.000 we were covered with people, shoulder by shoulder. And at that day, we had so many bags that we had to carry them and we have to protect the children, my brothers, 0:14:18.000,0:14:18.997 my siblings. 0:14:18.997,0:14:23.666 We have to carry bags, protect the children and we have to go 0:14:23.666,0:14:27.039 forward to get to the gates, but we couldn't.. 0:14:27.039,0:14:30.930 we couldn't, and we just left there to.. 0:14:30.930,0:14:31.430 0:14:31.430,0:14:40.440 to whom.. and my father said, "I'm not going to leave like this, I'm not going to go again and face this problem again, so we should wait.' 0:14:40.440,0:14:45.905 And then we have been there for over 0:14:45.905,0:14:49.320 one week under the Taliban government. 0:14:50.040,0:14:52.261 And I was.. 0:14:52.261,0:14:56.774 How old were you at that point? 0:14:56.774,0:14:58.895 I was, I think I was 20 0:14:58.895,0:15:00.305 20 or 19? 0:15:00.305,0:15:02.160 19. 0:15:03.720,0:15:06.076 And my.. 0:15:06.076,0:15:14.409

It was a big risk being under the Taliban government for my father, because he was working with the U.S. Embassy and they were .. 0:15:14.409,0:15:19.268 the U.S. was a big enemy 0:15:19.268,0:15:23.132 for the Taliban, and the work.. and the people that worked for 0:15:23.132,0:15:28.620 them, they are supposed an enemy from that people, so ... 0:15:29.340,0:15:30.355 so we were 0:15:30.355,0:15:34.136 terrified and we just .. 0:15:34.136,0:15:37.793 we were just waiting for their call to go. 0:15:37.793,0:15:40.974 On August 26th, 0:15:40.974,0:15:46.021 we received another call from them, that "we provided some 0:15:46.021,0:15:49.185 cars, that they can 0:15:49.185,0:15:53.496 get you through.. that they can get you inside 0:15:53.496,0:15:57.540 the airport." So we went there and we faced 0:15:58.080,0:16:03.087 problems, even with those buses. 0:16:03.087,0:16:10.922 We walked out the bus in front of the airport gate and the people that were 0:16:10.922,0:16:16.172 surrounding that airport gates, knew that 0:16:16.172,0:16:23.692 we are planning to leave and we are good to go inside and they just kind of attacked us. 0:16:23.692,0:16:25.820 They grabbed .. 0:16:25.820,0:16:33.454 They grabbed my shoulders, my mom's shoulders and everyone. They just pretending that they are with us, 0:16:33.454,0:16:42.881 and the military and the security guard that were there just pointing the gun at me and telling me that "go away." 0:16:42.881,0:16:43.381 They 0:16:43.381,0:16:50.310 didn't know that we are part of that bus. They didn't know who was part of that bus that 0:16:50.310,0:16:54.765 should go inside, and they just firing the guns in front of 0:16:54.765,0:16:58.200 my legs and pointing the gun that "go away."

0:16:58.920,0:17:01.743 That must have been a terrifying experience for you. 0:17:01.743,0:17:05.971 Well, for everyone, that is terrifying, but 0:17:05.971.0:17:10.010 especially for that we didn't even 0:17:10.010,0:17:16.512 watch or see a gun in front of us. We didn't have .. 0:17:16.512,0:17:26.151 we didn't touch anything, but there's.. attacks come that they fire and pointing those guns at us 0:17:26.151,0:17:32.411 to go away. That was really horrible, and by the time that we get in.. 0:17:32.411,0:17:41.713 get inside the airport, everyone was crying, including my mom, my sister, my brothers. And I was fully in dust, 0:17:41.713,0:17:44.093 in dust and everything. 0:17:44.093,0:17:47.204 I said to my mom .. 0:17:47.204,0:17:53.376 I should say that you're the the oldest in your family, so you have a sense of responsibility, I imagine, for protecting your siblings. 0:17:53.376,0:17:54.840 Yes, of course! 0:17:54.840,0:17:57.355 I was the last.. 0:17:57.355,0:17:59.964 the last one that went inside 0:17:59.964,0:18:05.974 the airport. I had to make sure my brothers, my mom, everyone was inside and then I went inside. 0:18:05.974,0:18:14.700 Can I back up a little bit? Before you got to the airport, you had to decide what to bring with you. 0:18:15.540,0:18:20.040 How did you do that? What did you bring with you? How much were you allowed to bring? 0:18:21.180,0:18:29.340 Actually, we knew that the process of leaving is very hard. We knew that it's not the actual 0:18:29.340,0:18:29.840 travels that 0:18:29.840,0:18:33.360 we did or everyone did. 0:18:33.360,0:18:38.280 It's completely different. But at that time, we had.. 0:18:39.540,0:18:44.940 The first time that we left, we had so many things. We had the bags of our carpets 0:18:44.940,0:18:47.405 that we we needed to

0:18:47.405,0:18:47.905 carrv 0:18:47.905,0:18:51.283 we needed them 0:18:51.283,0:18:56.852 with us. We had them and while we saw the challenges that 0:18:56.852,0:19:04.011 we cannot .. we realized that we cannot carry these bags with us while having those problems. 0:19:04.011,0:19:15.247 We just went home and just cut everything. We just get ourselves a bag of clothes and some foods to eat during the process, 0:19:15.247,0:19:16.381 nothing else. 0:19:16.381,0:19:18.265 You had to leave behind .. 0:19:18.265,0:19:19.560 Everything. 0:19:20.880,0:19:22.680 Yeah, so.. 0:19:22.680,0:19:31.680 We have a house that is three three stories 0:19:32.400,0:19:36.034 and we left everything inside, only one room, 0:19:36.034,0:19:42.401 one big room. We left everything including my bicycles, my 0:19:42.401,0:19:45.526 my motorbike, everything we left.. 0:19:45.526,0:19:51.140 we left there. And we moved with only a bag of clothes 0:19:51.140,0:19:56.700 and food that we needed on the way of leaving. 0:19:58.560,0:20:00.556 I can only imagine what that was like. 0:20:00.556,0:20:05.400 Yeah, that was.. that was.. 0:20:06.720,0:20:07.736 I suppose that 0:20:07.736,0:20:10.344 that is the dark side of 0:20:10.344,0:20:14.891 my life. That is horrible. 0:20:14.891,0:20:17.100 So you get to the airport, 0:20:18.420,0:20:23.400 it's difficult to make it through, it's very crowded, it sounds very chaotic, 0:20:24.900,0:20:28.639 but you finally made it into the airport? 0:20:28.639,0:20:29.139

Yes. 0:20:29.139,0:20:36.711 Yes, we finally made it, after those gunfire and everything, we made it. 0:20:36.711,0:20:43.001 We went inside the airport and we waited for four or eight hours 0:20:43.001,0:20:46.920 in the line to get to the airport and move to Qatar. 0:20:46.920,0:20:49.240 So first 0:20:49.240,0:20:50.760 you went to Qatar? -Yeah! 0:20:50.760,0:20:52.015 How long were you there? 0:20:52.015,0:20:55.079 After Kabul, 0:20:55.079,0:20:57.754 we went to the airport, 0:20:57.754,0:21:10.308 we moved inside the airplanes that we had to move to Qatar, and the moment that the plane get into the air, everyone inside that plane was crying. 0:21:10.308,0:21:12.484 They all knew that maybe this is 0:21:12.484,0:21:18.124 the last time that they're here. They're never going to be back at their country. 0:21:18.124,0:21:23.720 And it was, if understand correctly from the video I saw, 0:21:24.000,0:21:25.728 like a military cargo plane, 0:21:25.728,0:21:26.918 right? It wasn't 0:21:26.918,0:21:35.395 in a passenger plane. -Yeah, it was a military cargo plane that we had to sit on the floor. 0:21:35.395,0:21:39.630 We didn't have any seats and 0:21:39.630,0:21:49.152 sitting over the metal of that airplane was hard, and we spent like five hours inside that plane. 0:21:49.152,0:21:58.392 Five or six hours that was really hard. And the moment that it landed in Qatar, it was.. 0:21:58.392,0:22:00.909 it was really hot there. 0:22:00.909,0:22:04.184 Qatar is really hot. You can't even stand 0:22:04.184,0:22:07.845 for a minute under that weather. 0:22:07.845,0:22:15.310 I remember in the video that you sent, which I will include in this project,

We were so tired of being on a plane like that, and we wanted a place to sleep.

And the day that we moved there, 0:31:24.538,0:31:25.967 there were like 0:31:25.967,0:31:31.562 15 or 14 families there, in the same building, 0:31:31.562,0:31:40.652 which that was good for us, it's very amazing, they were good people and we kind of didn't feel away from.. 0:31:40.652,0:31:43.952 from our people, from our country, and those. 0:31:43.952,0:31:48.969 So there were 15 families from Afghanistan all living in the same apartment? 0:31:48.969,0:31:50.113 Yes, yes. 0:31:50.113,0:31:54.231 Interesting! So, 0:32:49.433,0:32:57.983 they helped us a lot, with the settlement, the directions that, "where should I buy those?" and, veah.. 0:32:57.983,0:33:02.945 When you say 'they' helped us, who is 'they'?
