Let's begin with your name. Do people in the United States have trouble saying your first name,

So when Filipinos think about family, do they think of it as a large extended family? Do you
have a large family in the Philippines?

Yeah, I grew up with my cousins nearby, we grew up together, yeah.

have to pump the water out of the.. from underground, and we bring it inside the..

inside our home, and we can use it to you know wash everything, yeah, we did that.

from elementary to high school,

And look at you now!

Do you still have the opportunity to speak Tagalog with family members here?

speak English, no Tagalog, because we want them not to forget to, you know,

Absolutely, so you raise your children
bilingually?

he doesn't know how to speak Tagalog, he speaks English, weirdly.

The only room.. we have the bedroom for only my parents,

How many people were in the house all together when you were growing up?

In my grandparents',

one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight?

Yeah, eight, sometimes nine, sometimes ten, whoever comes.

But in my parents it's.. my five.. we are five
0:12:00.349,0:12:06.591
children in there, with my four siblings, and my parents, my mother and father,

so it was seven.

And how did you feel about that when you were growing up, with all these people living together
in one place?

turn around, he says, "can you please close my door before you..?"

Okay, I realized that we don't do that in our country.

And actually we don't have our bedroom. So,

While these kids my age during that time,
I needed privacy, too, but I didn't

have that chance to have my privacy, because me and my siblings, we shared the same..

I believe that's a room. We just, I lay a mop.. I lay down some kind of a mat, and then we all
laying

Tell me a little bit about meal times in your family.

I learned how to cook, because at an early age, like six, you must learn how to cook. At the age

of six years old.And you must learn how to wash clothes manually by your hands. So everything we

must learn it from our parents, or we must learn it.

It's a must, so yeah, and..

If you don't have rice, you feel weak?

Yeah, we tried that here, when we came here first, that okay, let's eat like Americans; bread,
cereal,

my kids are like, "mom can we have rice? We feel dizzy."

I'm telling you it's true. We feel dizzy. So yeah, back in my country we all..

It sounds like a very important dish.

Let's go.. Are there other foods that are really important in Filipino culture, like traditional
foods?

Every Lenten Season.. no, not.. on Lenten Season, we don't eat meat, we avoid meat. During
Lenten Season,

we can only eat fish, that's it. And..

what's this.. All Soul's Day, yeah,

we put this, we call it..

it's like a sticky rice. We put it in the

altar, it's like to..

we have this belief that our relatives who passed away will visit our homes,
0:19:03.900,0:19:06.499
and that's offering.
0:19:06.499,0:19:08.960
Your ancestors.
0:19:08.960,0:19:15.830
Yeah, not only ancestors, but any relatives or loved ones that passed away.

So you would offer sticky rice to ancestors and to other family members?

- And when you mentioned the altar, was that an altar in your home?

Yeah we have an altar, yeah.

- Can you describe to me what that was like?
- Yeah, there's a..

    figure of this big picture or figure of

Mama Mary or Jesus Christ, a cross and
Santo Nino, yeah..

And we see to it that we put in this

sampaguita, Jasmine flower.. yeah.
0:19:56.660,0:19:59.366
That sounds beautiful.

Do you still have an altar in your home now? Do you continue that tradition?

I have made something, but not that.. like we, back in my county, we have that special place
at home.

But now, I just brought this Santo Niño and my cross from the Philippines here, and

The Santo Niño, does that mean the..

You mentioned earlier the importance of holidays, and you started to talk about Christmas. Could
you tell me more about your memories of celebrating Christmas

in the Philippines when you were a child?

Yeah, Christmas for me is very special,
0:20:49.421,0:21:00.120
because that's the time when we can eat special food that we don't eat the ordinary days.
-What kind of food?

We have this usually spaghetti, pancit it's
noodles or pancit, lumpia..
-What is lumpia?
-It's egg roll, egg roll and..

-It's beef stew.
-Beef stew?
-Yeah!

Do you associate Christmas with beef stew? You remember that?

you always find that in every, you know,

And you mentioned earlier that gifts were very important on Christmas. Can you share any
memories you have about special gifts that you received, or that you gave?
